C battle against menacing weed

ragwort, or Senecio dius, is getting the heave-ho DoC's Whitiau Scientific e south of Wanganui, thanks help of volunteers and prison

tively new to New Zealand and nui, the weed is threatening rvival of about 120 species of ad endangered plants in the prompting DoC to tent a control programme.

nganui field centre manager iy lathgoe said DoC had ied a problem with pink t about three years ago and although little was known about the plant then it was decided to begin ripping it out before it became an insurmountable problem

"This is our third year of control and we're getting on top of it, but recognise that it'll be an ongoing battle with a constant seed source in the forest right next door to the reserve." Mr Lithgoe said.

The weed is also known as the African holly-leaved daisy and features attractive purple flowers in spring and summer.

Mr Lythgoe said now was the best time to begin pulling the plant before flowering and seeding.

DoC conservancy advisory scientist Colin Ogle said he was investigating various funding avenues for funding an impact study of the plant and the impact of removing it. His investigations were proving positive.

About a dozen community volunteers and 20 Kaitoke Prison inmates spent yesterday ripping the weed out of the 250-hectare reserve as part of the ongoing control programme.
